You are a lifeline for so many 100 years and strong A tether to reality You've helped us for so long


We can struggle from time to time

That can be pulled by a string


Insulin, oh insulin, how do I owe thee?

Nor lows to highs but, hopefully, those numbers in between








Insulin is to me like a windmill is to generating electricity.

I'm alive. I thrive.


And now I'm up to five.


No complaints. It works. I'm fine.



He gave us insulin so we can keep dancing










Hormone controlling Pancreas cells in body Regulate glucose




# Gary Montuori Diagnosed with diabetes in 1999
